Calgary Youth Justice Society connects adult volunteers in a positive way with young people who are at risk of or have involvement with the criminal justice system. Our approach is always strength focused, seeing beyond what's wrong to nurture what's strong. Our impact

is young people who feel valued and supported to be a part of our community in a meaningful way.

INTHE LEAD PROGRAM

Youth participants, despite facing obstacles and challenges in their life, are not referred to the program based on need; rather, they are nominated for the program based on possibility. By attending a weekly class, in one school semester, Young Leaders (youth participants) recognize, nurture and practice individual strengths and character competencies that are known to build resilience. Upon completion, Young Leaders that are in the



school system can earn credits towards their diploma. Beyond the contribution of valuable financial resources, our corporate partners are engaging their employees as Volunteer Coaches to connect one on one with Young Leaders, providing valuable encouragement and support.

INTHE LEAD 180

In the Lead 180 is a character and leadership development program designed for youth in conflict with the criminal justice system. The objective is to build and enhance key protective factors that are known to reduce risk taking behavior and reoffending.



YOUTH JUSTICE COMMITTEE PROGRAM

A community-based alternative to court that gives young people a second chance on a bad decision. Youth Justice Committee volunteers help young people move through

and past a minor offence by holding them accountable without holding them back.
With support, young people from all walks of life turn their mistakes into opportunities to grow and give back to their communities.

The last year has been fast paced and full of exciting growth and opportunity at CYJS. When we reflect on how that is possible during what many consider to be a challenging time we are overwhelmed by gratitude for our community of supporters that show up in so many ways with open minds and open hearts. In 2022, we emerged out of a multi-year pandemic, navigating uncharted waters with a sense of newfound hope. Our programs continued to thrive through 2022. Our dedicated CYJS team of staff and volunteers has worked hard to achieve an overall growth of 70% in the number of youths served from the previous year. Our Youth Justice Committee program grew by increasing the opportunity for youth facing minor charges to be diverted from court with direct referrals from our partner, Calgary Police Service. In

the Lead also served more youth and grew our community partnerships by 300% to serve a more diverse population of vulnerable youth. We want to thank all our school and community program partners without whom we wouldn't be able to connect with the youth we serve.

This is all made possible through the generous support of our funders and individual donors. Thank you for the continued financial support for In the Lead from founding partner Cenovus Energy, FCSS, RBC, Shaw Charity Classic, City of Calgary Crime Prevention Investment Plan, Calgary Foundation, and Cadillac Fairview. Thank you to Alberta Public Safety and Emergency Services and Alberta Law Foundation for supporting the Youth Justice Committee program. We also want to recognize the many individual donors who give generously to help us reach deserving young people.

2023 marks an important milestone for CYJS as we celebrate 25 years as a Society. We hope that you will engage with the communications and activities we have planned throughout the year.

A STRONG PLAN REACHES MORE YOUNG PEOPLE.

By 2024, CYJS will double the youth we serve, our partners and our revenue to reach more vulnerable youth in Calgary. Finishing our third year of our Strategic Plan, we are pleased once again to be meeting and exceeding our ambitious annual goals: increased our program revenue through continued and new support from individual donors, corporate, foundation, and government partners. We served 70% more youth. We welcomed new school and community partners, we increased awareness of what we do through events, conference presentations and social media. We also strengthened our organizational infrastructure through a Fund Development and Donor Stewardship Strategy as well as a new Engagement Manager position to implement our plans. Please consider supporting our 2023 fundraising goal of \$125,000.

We will grow our impact amongst vulnerable youth in Calgary

- Deliver programming in more high schools and community settings
- ✓ Reach more youth facing multiple barriers, meeting the greatest need

It currently costs us approximately \$1770 per young person we serve, all-in. This investment is proven to pay dividends – to young people, their families and our community at large for years and lifetimes. With more resources, we can ensure futures for more young people:

RECOGNITION

Every year, CYJS recognizes a partnership and an individual or organization who have helped us along the way. Whether the contribution is short or long, big or small, it all makes a difference.

The Strong Not Wrong Community Partner Award is presented to Miskanawah Community Services Association. This award recognizes individuals or organizations who have contributed to the work of Calgary Youth Justice Society in a way that helps us do more by working together.

Miskanawah has been a tremendous advocate for the In the Lead program and sees the youth we serve as members of a larger community who are paving the way for future generations. Miskanawah demonstrates a strength-based

The development of this partnership has also offered the opportunity for CYJS to be accountable, curious and dedicated to our commitment of reconciliation, and for that, we are incredibly grateful.

The Cenovus Energy Difference Maker Award is presented to Anne Miller, Principal Consultant, Constellation Consulting Group. This award recognizes an individual or organization who has helped CYJS to make a difference in our community that otherwise would not have been possible. Anne is a Credentialed Evaluator through the Canadian Evaluation Society, an accredited SROI practitioner and licensed SROI trainer through the Social Value Network International. Anne's specialty is in crime prevention, youth at-risk and housing. Anne has supported CYJS for more than



a decade to survey, evaluate and measure the positive impact that our programs are having on youth participants, volunteers and the community.



The Denise Blair Leadership Award

To commemorate her 25th Anniversary as the founder of the Calgary Youth Justice Society, a leadership award was created in Denise Blair's name. This award recognizes a CYJS youth program participant who demonstrates leadership qualities that reflect the values Denise has instilled as pillars of the CYJS foundation. These include compassion, integrity, curiosity, collaboration, and commitment to community.

Philemon Little Shields is a natural leader and always shows up with authenticity, humor, dedication, respect and a strong commitment to his family and community. He has an abundance of compassion for everyone he meets. At a recent program

event, Philomen gathered left over pizza and brought it to people experiencing homelessness. He is always looking for ways to expand his relationship with Elders and volunteers at many cultural events and Miskanawah. Through drumming, singing and dancing,



he demonstrates how important culture is to him and inspires other to connect with cultural practices as well. Despite sometimes experiencing racism at school, Philemon works diligently to complete his education. Philemon is a true leader, always seeking to learn and understand more about who he is and how he can impact our community. He is paving the way for other indigenous youth to be excited about what THEY can offer the world.

In the Lead youth participants who developed a new awareness and ability to draw upon the strengths relating to a Core Competency or developed a stronger understanding of their current strengths and ability to creatively draw up them when facing new situations or challenges:

- Personal Confidence 89%
- Personal Awareness and Stress Management 86%
- Emotional and Social Intelligence 98%
- Courageous Leadership 98%
- Knowledgeable Judgement 95%
- Resilience and Growth Mindset 96%
- Motivation and Self-Directed Learning 96%
- Moral Directedness and Integrity 96%
- Interpersonal and Collaboration Skills 98%
- Effective and Accountable Problem Solving 94%

Young people are taking accountability for their actions and growing through their mistakes:

• 91% of youth successfully completed their sanctions

The Calgary Police Service Youth Diversion Project increased awareness of Youth Justice Committees and diversion options for youth with CPS officers. As a result, a greater percentage of youth are being diverted from formal justice processes without having to attend court.

• 119% increase in the number of referrals to Youth

Justice Committees since last year

The Community Awareness Project resulted in more people being more informed about Youth Justice Committees and the Youth Criminal Justice Act – including youth/parents, community agencies who serve youth, and the general public.

- 1,500 people attended presentations to increase their understanding of and engagement with the Youth Criminal Justice Act and Youth Justice Committees
- 2000 people received resources about the YJC program
- Social media has grown to over **1000** followers

programs and most importantly, people that help the youth and community stand up on their feet and be the leader they are. Not only do they teach how to be a leader and how to face challenges, they also teach what it means to be a leader and why facing challenges is important to thrive and succeed. That's not the only thing because leaders need breaks, time to collect and regain themselves which is what In the Lead also provides. They bring food, bus tickets, gifts etc. to make you feel included and cared about. They are also there to listen to what you're going through and give you all the help they can to make sure you have all the options you need to overcome any problem you may face in life. Which I can say I have a firsthand view of because before being enrolled in this program I wasn't going down the path me and my family had wished for and made horrible mistakes with serious consequences. Yet the people of In the Lead had reached out to me and pulled me out of that rut I was in even while a whole pandemic was going on. So with my experience at In the Lead and meeting the people I've met there, I can happily say that In the Lead helped me take my life back when I lost grasp of it. I'll never forget how they helped me, so to everyone involved in this program, thank you with all my heart and I hope you guys can keep making a change in youth and in the future."

"The YJC volunteers felt that Joe* would benefit from attending In the Lead 180 as he is seen as a role model by his peers and based on the fact that he had demonstrated leadership by leaving the group home in an attempt to stop the other youth from further escalating as well. And in supporting his passion for animation the volunteers also assigned Andrew to create an animation that showed different ways he could better cope with the stress of living in a group home. At the closing meeting Joe shared that he enjoyed attending In the Lead 180 as he was able to connect with peers his own age and it reinforced the positive qualities he knows he has. Joe then shared the animation he created, and he seemed guite proud of it and he happily agreed to allow the YJC program to use it as an example of a positive sanction. The animation highlighted different coping strategies including going for a run or walk, talk to a friend, take a nap or play a computer game. Joe shared that the animation was a good reminder to try and manage his stress and frustrations. Overall, Joe said his experience with the EJS program and YJC volunteers was positive and he was thankful the opportunity. The group home staff supporting Joe also expressed appreciation and felt it was a positive experience for Joe and helped him take responsibility."

"The ITL program connects agencies and people who work directly with youth from all backgrounds, identities, abilities and experiences to collectively connect incredible youth who may not fit the limited standard definition of potential leader (and the opportunities connected to an adult seeing that in a youth) to genuine, affirming and supportive spaces that see the good that's there, and helps the youth recognize, tune into and nurture what they have to share. The world becomes brighter with each person who steps into their own and believes in their good and what they can share. Resilience doesn't come from things being easy. It comes from the tougher stuff and having someone be able to help get you standing again, look a youth in the eye and say 'I'm here. I know you can do this. You're not alone' changes a person, and it can change a life. I love that youth are paired 1:1 with a coach, as it creates stronger connections and trust, especially knowing that they have someone in their corner, just for them. Imagine how different the world would be if we shifted to this and put in a little extra time to actually see and listen to people, especially youth. Thank you for the light you see in others!"
